

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month




April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Distracted driving is now an epidemic of major proportions. It is well known that texting while driving is the main distraction behind the wheel, but there are other high risk distractive behaviors such as talking on the phone or with passengers, listening to music, drinking coffee, and applying makeup, among others. Distracted driving means

robbing oneself of precious seconds needed to avoid a crash, which could be fatal.

In April, we take the time to reflect and take responsibility for the decisions we make when we drive to have a safe trip for ourselves and others on the road. The following tips will help you drive responsibly:

- If you need to send a text, pull over and park in a safe location to do it.
- Assign a passenger as your "designated texter" to answer calls and texts.
- Do not scroll through apps, including social media, while driving. If you find this difficult, put your cell phone on the back seat, trunk, or glove compartment.

One of the components of the Distracted Driving Awareness Month is the National Campaign <u>You Drive. You Text. You Pay.</u> This campaign reminds drivers of the dangers and consequences of texting and driving. Also, from April 4 to April 11, you may see increased law enforcement. The goals of this campaign is to demonstrate a nationwide commitment to the reinforcing of texting laws, and reduce injuries and deaths caused by distracted driving, namely texting and driving.









Did you know you can set your phone to automatically silence notifications while you drive? Here are the steps for different types of cell phones:



Use the Driving Focus on your iPhone to concentrate on the road

When you have the Driving Focus set up, you can ask Siri to read replies to you, so you don't have to look at your iPhone. Incoming calls are allowed only when iPhone is connected to CarPlay, a car Bluetooth system, or a hands-free accessory. Go to Settings > Focus, then tap Driving.

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How to use the Do not disturb mode on your Galaxy phone

Before you try the recommendations below, be sure to check if your device's software and related apps are updated to the latest version. To update your mobile device's software, follow these steps: Step 1. Go to Settings > Software update. Step 2. Tap on Download and install. Step 3.

Have driving mode turn on automatically on your Pixel phone

On Pixel 3 and later, you can set Do Not Disturb or Android Auto to turn on when you're driving. On your Pixel 2, you can set Do Not Disturb to turn on when you're driving. For the best phone exper

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Drive Safely in Work Zones




Kansas Department of Transportation construction and maintenance workers face danger on a daily basis in their jobs.

Your Life is at Risk

Did you know that 85% of the people who are killed in work zones crashes are the drivers traveling through them?

Drivers may think they don't need to slow down if they don't see workers present or may try to beat another driver to be first before a lane is closed in a work zone.

Loose gravel, narrowed lanes, and uneven pavement can make driving through a work zone dangerous for drivers who are not patient and considerate of being safe.

Work Zone Safety Tips:

- Follow traffic control
- Stay alert
- · Watch for workers
- Expect delays
- Allow ample space between you and the car in front of you
- Change lanes when directed to do so

Stay Alert in Work Zones

Avoid distracted driving behaviors like:

- Texting, taking pictures, streaming, or using social media
- Talking to passengers
- Using GPS
- · Using a cell phone
- · Combing your hair or looking at yourself in the mirror
- · Eating, drinking, or smoking
- · Reading, including maps
- Adjusting your radio or music
