

New Year, New Driver?



While many people get their driver's license in their teen years, some adults wait to learn how to drive later in life. Their parents may decide they are not yet mature enough for the responsibility of driving a vehicle, they may simply choose to use available and accessible alternative transportation options, or they may feel anxiety around driving that causes them to put off learning how to drive.

You can aid your employees by knowing what driver education programs are available in your area and providing incentives for them or their children to complete a course. You can also provide them with information about alternative transportation options in your community.

Recent research indicates that teenagers are choosing to wait until they become adults to learn to drive. So, there will be more novice drivers on the road in the near future. This is a cultural change that requires a comprehensive driver's education program for this population to help it drive safely and responsibly.

A comprehensive driver's education program includes the teaching of safe driving habits and decision-making skills. It should also include, in addition to fundamental skills and practice, defensive driving techniques and evaluation and feedback on the students' progress.




Once a new driver obtains his or her driver's license, he or she will need training in areas that we usually learn from our parents or friends or in THE HARD way.

Those areas include:

- 1. How to change a tire
- 2. How to check the fluid levels
- 3. How to check tire pressure and fill it with air
- 4. How to connect your phone to the vehicle
- 5. What to do when you drive off the road
- 6. What to do if your accelerator sticks

- 7. What to do if you breakdown or get stuck
- 8. Where to find reliable safe driving information
- 9. When to fill up your vehicle with gas
- 10. What to do if you get pulled over by the police

All new drivers will face these situations. Driver's education equips them to pass the driver's license test. However, the real test is on the road in real situations. It is best to learn this before you must struggle when an emergency situation arises.

How safely your employees drive during the winter can affect your workplace whether they drive a company car or another vehicle.

If they drive a company car, they are representing the company, and if they drive another vehicle, a crash can result in injury or death.

This could affect production and consequently be detrimental to the company's bottom line.

According to the 2021 KDOT Facts Book, there were 3,048 traffic crashes which resulted in 4 fatalities in which snow and ice where involved. This means that a snow-ice involved crash occurred approximately every 3 hours.

- · Flashlight
- Extra gloves/hats/warm clothes
- Blankets
- ·Bottled water and non-perishable snacks

Working Effectively with Your Trickiest Colleague: Jack Frost -- Occupational Health & Safety

Employers can promote safe driving behavior by ensuring workers recognize the hazards of winter weather driving, are properly trained for driving in winter weather conditions and are licensed for the vehicles they operate.

Winter conditions can be especially harsh on vehicles and machinery, so having an effective maintenance program in place for all company vehicles and equipment is essential. It's important that they're checked regularly to ensure parts and systems are working properly, including brakes, defrosters, windshield wipers, tires, exhaust systems, electrical systems, cooling systems and engines.

Company vehicles should also include an emergency kit with items such as a cellphone or two-way radio, windshield ice scraper, snow brush, flashlight with extra batteries, shovel, tow chain, snow chains for tires, water and blankets.

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Here are some tips to discuss with your employees about driving during winter weather:

- 1. Buckle up! It's one of your best defenses and it's the law.
- 2. Be extra cautious in areas that are more prone to freeze quickly such as bridges, overpasses, intersections and shaded areas.
- 3. Check weather reports on TV, online at kandrive.org, or on the KanDrive app regularly so that you can prepare for bad weather. If you do not need to be on the road, consider staying at home.
- 4. Keep an emergency kit in your vehicle (water and blankets, a cellphone or a two-way radio, windshield ice scraper, snow chains for tires, tow chain, snow brush and flashlight with extra batteries)
- 5. Make sure that your car always has a full tank of gas.



KanDrive App Available



The Kansas Department of Transportation's KanDrive website is now available to download as an App on Android and iOS phones.

KanDrive provides travelers with timely details on maintenance and construction activities, winter highway conditions, flooded roadways, incidents and crashes affecting traffic.

The new app includes all account features on the KanDrive website. It offers real time, high-quality streaming of camera views across the state. The truckers' mode for commercial vehicle operators is still an option and now announces rest stop parking availability. The app also has a hands-free/eye-free feature that announces upcoming traffic events while traveling. Just tap the Tell Me sound icon in the top right corner to get announcements of upcoming events (feature requires location sharing).
